- 1. What do you think "freedom of speech" is? What does it mean?
- 2. What do you think "abridge" means?
- 3. Some have argued that for speech to be protected by the First Amendment, it has to be political speech, such as commenting on a campaign.
 - Does the Supreme Court agree with that?
 - Do you?
- 4. The Court says that the government can make rules on speech that involve time, manner, or place are allowed (meaning a government can tell you not to use a bullhorn in a park at 1 a.m. at night). But, the Court insists, these rules must be "viewpoint neutral"? What do you think they mean by that?
- 5. Does the Supreme Court believe that it matters whether someone is offended when deciding whether government can restrict speech?
 - Do you agree with the Court's answer?
- 6. Why is free speech important?
- 7. Are there reasons we might want the government to stop offensive speech?
- 8. Are there reasons we might think allowing the government to determine what speech is allowed is a bad idea?
- 9. How do current events affect your opinions?
- 10. How does your knowledge of history affect your opinions?
- 11. Are any of the parts of this bill unconstitutional? If so which? And why are those parts unconstitutional?
- 12. Are the parts of the bill that you think are constitutional also good ideas that should be passed? Or are they a bad idea even if constitutional? Why or why not?
- 13. Some scholars have argued that if the First Amendment does indeed protect offensive speech, it should be repealed. Do you agree?
